### A Brief History of Latino Voting Rights Since the 1960s

While the Voting Rights Act of 1965 included a section that ensured that people educated in US schools that were predominately taught in a language other than English – for instance, island Puerto Ricans – could not be denied the right to vote because of their inability to read, write, understand, or interpret material in English, Spanish-speakers in the contiguous US, including mainland Boricuas, were often still discriminated against at the polls. This changed on August 6, 1975, exactly one decade after the Voting Rights Act of 1965, when, following several court battles on behalf of Latino-Americans, President Gerald Ford amended the act to also end discrimination against so-called "language minorities." Protecting the voting rights of Latinos, as well as non-English-speaking Asian Americans and Native Americans, made it possible to translate registration materials into other languages and strengthened the political power of communities of color.

#### **Red Pandas**

Red pandas are mammals and much smaller than giant pandas. They are about one or two feet tall and twelve to twenty pounds each. Red pandas live in Asian rainforests high up in the trees. Red pandas are nocturnal, which means they sleep in the day and are awake at night. Red pandas eat bamboo, fruit, roots, acorns, eggs, small birds and even rodents!



Red pandas have babies called cubs. These cubs usually have tan or gray fur and are born in litters and there are one to four cubs in a litter. Red pandas are full grown at eighteen months old, then they leave their family to make a new family.

Red pandas are in danger of going extinct which means that they are dying out, like what happened to dinosaurs. We have to take care of red pandas both in the wild and in the zoo.

#### The Critical Race Theory:

The Critical Race Theory movement considers many of the same issues that conventional civil rights and ethnic studies take up but places them in a broader perspective that includes economics, history, and even feelings and the unconscious. Unlike traditional civil rights, which embraces incrementalism and step by step progress, critical race theory questions the very foundations of the liberal order, including equality theory, legal reasoning, Enlightenment rationalism and principles of constitutional law.

#### Discrimination

The unequal treatment of members of various groups based on race, gender, social class, sexual orientation, physical ability, religion and other categories.

# Definitions of Race & Equity Cont'd

#### **Diversity:**

Diversity includes all the ways in which people differ, and it encompasses all the different characteristics that make one individual or group different from another. It is all-inclusive and recognizes everyone and every group as part of the diversity that should be valued. A broad definition includes not only race, ethnicity, and gender — the groups that most often come to mind when the term "diversity" is used — but also age, national origin, religion, disability, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, education, marital status, language, and physical appearance. It also involves different ideas, perspectives, and values.
